Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services Committee Recommendations on

the Governor's Supplemental Budget Bill (LD 2214)

We are writing to provide the recommendations of the Joint Standing Committee on Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services on the initiatives under the committee's policy jurisdiction included in the Governor's Supplemental Budget Bill (LD 2214). These items were considered in a joint public hearing on February 28, 2024. At a separate work session, the committee also reviewed and discussed these initiatives. We make the following recommendations.

Initiatives Included in Part A

The 10 members¹ of the committee present and voting make the following recommendations with respect to these initiatives.

The committee unanimously voted to **include** the following initiatives:

- 1. Ref. # 43: This initiative eliminates one-time funding for the cost of the benefit mandate providing coverage of infertility treatment as enacted by Public Law 2021, chapter 692, An Act To Provide Access to Fertility Care.
- 2. Ref. # 740: This initiative relates to the Board of Licensure in Medicine and continues and makes permanent one part-time Office Assistant I position previously continued by Financial Order 002855 F4 and provides funding for related All Other costs.
- 3. Ref. # 738: This initiative relates to the State Board of Nursing and provides funding for higher rent costs for leased office space and related STA-CAP cost.

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4. Ref. # 742: This initiative relates to the Board of Osteopathic Licensure and provides funding for higher rent costs for leased office space and related STA-CAP cost.

The committee voted 7-3² to **include** the following initiative:

Ref. #44: This initiative provides ongoing funding for the cost of the benefit mandate
providing coverage of infertility treatment as enacted by Public Law 2021, chapter 692, An
Act To Provide Access to Fertility Care. The members who do not support including this
initiative also recommend the repeal of Public Law 2021, chapter 692, An Act To Provide
Access to Fertility Care for health plans effective on or after January 1, 2026.

Language Part DDD

The committee voted 10-0³ to **include** the language to update the effective date of Public Law 2023, chapter 329, §2 to January 1, 2025 to be consistent with the intent of that allocations in that section to provide funding and authority for a Comprehensive Health Planner II to support the anticipated increase in workload associated with joining the Physical Therapy Licensure Compact on January 1, 2026.

Additional Recommendations for New Initiatives

The 10 members⁴ of the committee present and voting also unanimously voted to recommend the inclusion of 2 additional initiatives.

Funding for Office of Professional and Financial Regulation: The committee recommends that additional funding from the General Fund be provided to the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, Office of Professional and Occupational Regulation to support research or work associated with legislative initiatives outside of the core licensing functions of licensing boards, e.g. sunrise review of proposals to regulate new professions/occupations and licensing compact proposals.

Transfer of Statutory Responsibility for Collection of Opioid Product Registration Fee: The committee recommends that the statutory responsibility to collect the opioid product registration fee pursuant to 32 MRSA Section 13800-C be transferred from the Board of Pharmacy to the Department of Health and Human Services. The Board of Pharmacy acts solely as a pass-through entity to collect the fee and then transfer the funding to the Department of Health and Human Services. the committee supports transferring the responsibility for collecting the fees so that the limited staff and resources of the Board of Pharmacy can be focused on their core licensing and oversight functions. We will be happy to provide draft language at the committee's request.
