

Maine Military Authority shut down operations in 2019. Until final licensing closure activities are complete, remaining financial liabilities exist.

With your support and assistance, DVEM will continue to meet our State and Federal missions to authorize, plan provisions of resources, administer, conduct day-to-day operations and audits of all military training, preparation and readiness, delivery of quality services to all veterans, and emergency preparedness ensuring the protection of life, property, freedom and safety of all Maine's people. We remain consistent in our commitment to provide the best possible service, and I look forward to continuing serving as Commissioner, Adjutant General, and Homeland Security Advisor.






DVEM is an economic force multiplier with significant federal funding that supports state efforts.



to provide trained, equipped, and organized units and individuals to protect life, property, and preserve peace, order and public safety






Federal Role:




ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE AND AUTHORIZED STRENGTH

- Enhanced state delivery of services through increased inter-agency cooperation

















While optimized for response to incidents involving weapons of mass destruction, they can assist civil agencies with any natural or man-made disaster, and they provide this assistance at no cost to the requesting entity.


COUNTER-DRUG TASK FORCE



The Maine National Guard's Counter-Drug Task Force's mission is to support the detection, interdiction, disruption, and curtailment of illicit drug trafficking activities and use through the application of military skills and resources.

FY 24 Support

- \$1.6 Million Budget (federal funds)
- 13 Army & Air Guardsman Criminal Analysts helped multiple Law Enforcement Agencies achieve:
 - \$8 million worth of illegal drugs seized
 - \$248k in Illicit Currency Seized
 - 564 Drug Cases
 - 405 Arrests
 - Drug demand and opioid overdose reduction
- Certified 4 Prevention Trainers through "Keepin' It Real," an evidence-based social emotional learning program
- Supported 120 Youth Campers during two-week prevention event
- Drug take-back transportation / disposal support





STATE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

MBVS provides highly skilled veterans' services, which include claims services at eight field offices across the state, delivering direct services to our veterans in the community. The bureau also operates 15 iterant offices throughout the state.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS

- 10:1 return on investment (\$10 federal received for every \$1 state invested)
- 3,047 veterans and/or veteran dependents used their education benefits at Maine education and training facilities in 2024
- \$13,069,413 in VA education funding received for in-state institutions



- 177 emergency financial assistance actions for veterans resulting in \$214,486.96 paid to Maine veterans during a time of need
- \$50 million the total amount in federal benefits distributed to Maine Veterans and their dependents
- Laid to rest 585 total veterans and 388 spouses in Maine veterans cemeteries; received \$2.7 million in federal construction grants for cemetery expansion projects
- Began interring now-eligible National Guard and Reservist service members in Maine veterans cemeteries

MISSION

Through leadership, coordinate the protection of life, property, environment, and economy across all hazards by managing preparedness, mitigation, response, and recovery efforts with the State.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS

- Achieved 7:1 return on investment (\$7 federal received for every \$1 state dollar invested)
- Activated the state Emergency Operations Center to monitor presidential election
- Passed through over \$72.4 million in federal grants to state and local partners
- Managed twelve open disasters, the most in the Northeast United States
- Launched a new grant-funded project to fund generators in 45 municipalities
- Led preparedness efforts ahead of the 2024 Solar Eclipse
