Attached please find the Judiciary Committee's biennial budget work sheet and proposed amendments. The work sheet indicates vote totals for each initiative and language proposal. The voting grid, also attached, indicates the votes of the individual members of the Judiciary Committee.

Please note that we have tabled the proposed budgets for the Maine Commission on Indigent Legal Services and the proposed Office of the Public Defender, as well as Part UUUU (which proposes to create the Office of the Public Defender). We are exploring various ways to address the concerns which have prompted the proposal of the changes in Part UUUU, and will provide you with recommendations in the near future. We would like to draw to your attention that the Supplemental Budget did not include sufficient funding for the completion of the current fiscal year through June 30th, so those delayed appropriations will need to be added to the funding already included in the biennial budget for MCILS (if not otherwise covered by the end of this fiscal year). Also, the baseline budget for the biennial budget did not take into account the full appropriation to MCILS in the first year of the current biennium, so the underfunding continues into the 2018-2019 biennium. We will take that into account as we continue to work on this matter.

Justification:

The mission of the Attorney General's Office is to provide high quality legal services, to enforce the law, to prosecute homicides and other major crimes, to ensure the safety of Maine people, collect funds owed the state, to protect consumers, to protect the environment, and to defend and represent state agencies.

The Attorney General is a constitutional officer, elected by the Legislature and independent from the Executive agencies it serves. The Office of the Attorney General provides legal services for State agencies as required by statute, and engages in proactive legal measures when in the public interest. The Attorney General also consults with the eight District Attorneys and provides legal advice to law enforcement agencies.

The Office of the Attorney General includes the following divisions:

Administrative Services Division is responsible for budgeting, human resources, accounting, and other administrative functions of Le Office. The Division manages the Victims' Compensation Program, which provides reimbursement to

victims of violent crime for certain financial losses, and includes the Civil Rights Team Project.

The Child Support Enforcement Division represents the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) in the area of child support enforcement.

The Child Protection Division represents DHHS in the area of child protection. The work of these two divisions is done out of four offices-Portland, Augusta, Bangor, and Caribou. Attorneys and paralegals in these areas have the most persistent and heavy caseloads of any Divisions in the Office of the Attorney General.

The Health and Human Services Division provides legal representation for all other programs in DHHS, including the MaineCare program, involuntary mental health commitments, defense of lawsuits against the Department and its employees, public guardianship/conservatorship issues, licensure of homes for both adults and children, enforcement of the State's public health laws, enforcement of adult protective laws, represents DHHS's interest in federal benefits programs such as MaineCare and TANF and the AMHI and Community Consent Decree cases.

The Criminal Division is exclusively responsible for the prosecution of homicides occurring in the State and concurrently responsible with the District Attorneys for all other criminal matters. This division handles certain criminal appeals to the Supreme Judicial Court, petitions for post-conviction relief, and federal habeas corpus matters. The Maine Drug Task Force attorneys and the Drug Prosecution Coordinator prosecute drug-related cases investigated by the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency (MDEA) and other police agencies. The Division represents the Department of Public Safety and acts as extradition officer for the Governor. Members of the Criminal Division prosecute white collar and financial crimes and frauds against State government, including welfare fraud, health care crimes, tax crimes and securities violations. The division also directs enforcement actions under the Maine Civil Rights Act.

The Investigation Division investigates fraud against the State and provides direct investigative services for other divisions in the Department. The Division is responsible for investigating police-involved fatalities, certain crimes against public officials, hate crimes, and financial exploitation of elders. The Division serves as a resource for other law enforcement agencies, participates in law enforcement training and conducts investigations for the Medical Board, the Osteopathic Board and the Tobacco and Substance Abuse programs.

The Litigation Division defends the state under the Maine Tort Claims Act, in civil rights actions brought pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 and in employment and discrimination matters. The division handles court actions not involving a particular agency and assists with complex litigation matters. The Division represents the Baxter State Park Authority.

Justification:

This initiative provides funding to transition three locations from analog to digital (Voice Over Internet Protocol - VoIP) systems. VoIP provides more functionality, eliminates technician interaction, and is easier to scale a growing workforce than analog phones. VoIP utilizes existing data ports within an office environment and eliminates the need for specific wiring tied to a specific phone number (required with analog). The VoIP phones have more features that are necessary and helpful to busy office environments. The initiative includes estimated costs of \$40,000 for a gateway - a physical device much like a switch or router. With VoIP there is no actual phone provider like Fairpoint or AT&T, so there needs to be a way to point 911 calls to a specific location, hence the gateway. The gateway is programmed so when a VoIP number dials 911 the emergency responders know where to go - city, street, building and floor. The initiative also includes \$11,000 for 43 VoIP phones.

Justification:

This initiative requests funding for the management-initiated reorganization of one Secretary Associate Legal position to a Secretary Specialist Supervisor approved by the Bureau of Human Resources 11/2/2016. The Criminal Division of the Office of the Attorney General, pursuant to Title 5 section 200-D, is responsible for the investigation and prosecution of all homicide cases, including direct appeals and the unsolved homicide unit. The Criminal Division also encompasses: counsel to the Maine Department of Public Safety; the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit; prosecution of Financial Crimes, including but not limited to Welfare, Tax, and Elder Fraud; Statewide Drug Prosecution; counsel to the Maine Computer Crimes Task Force; counsel to the Office of Securities; 3 Victim Witness Advocate positions; and counsel for Sexual Offender Registration and Notification Act issues. This Secretary Specialist Supervisor position will have direct oversight and give direction to six support staff who provide support to the Division's 24 Attorneys, 4 Detectives and 3 Victim Advocates. This shift of oversight will allow the Deputy Attorney General who is the Division Chief to focus on managing the myriad of issues in the Division, including the prosecution of homicide cases. Failure to fund this position will impact the prosecution of cases that directly impacts public safety.

Justification:

The Consumer Division includes consumer complaints, tobacco enforcement, collections of monies due the State, antitrust, and legal efforts against inappropriate business transactions. Work has increased with no increase in support staff; currently this busy Division has just one secretary position covering all administrative efforts. The collections practice is very notification and form intensive requiring significant effort tracking, filing and ensuring timely responses and follow up. New state law requires that data breach notices be filed with this Division. This requires the maintenance of an organized database and prompt response to requests to the public as we receive frequent Freedom of Information Act requests for these documents. In addition, contacts to the Consumer Protection Division have increased significantly over the years, from 6,874 to more than 12,000 in 2015, which requires more follow up, tracking, written correspondence, and timely communications with consumers. Failure to fund this position will put at risk the Division's ability to respond, communicate, and serve thousands of consumers and will hinder the ability to take timely and effective action on collection efforts.

Justification:

Consumer contacts to the Consumer Protection Division have increased significantly in recent years. In 2012 the Division sceived 6,874 consumer contacts; 10,120 in 2013; 12,103 in 2014; 12,916 in 2015; and 11,221 through October 2016. As consumers become savvier about their rights and continue to hold businesses to a higher standard as a result of the products they purchase this office will continue to see an increase in phone calls, emails, walk-ins and letters from

consumers seeking assistance.

Specifically, the Assistant Complaint Examiner (ACE) position is responsible for: answering the consumer hotline which is staffed from 9-4 daily; responding to consumer emails; sorting and responding to incoming mail; assisting the 25 volunteer mediators; explaining to consumers how to complete the complaint forms for mediation; and gathering data as needed from the database for pending enforcement actions. All of these tasks can vary in time and effort depending on the consumer and whether additional research is warranted.

Failure to get another position hinders the Division's ability to investigate and prosecute businesses not following the law. As consumer awareness increases, they look to this office to protect them based on the law. In addition to what is already listed above, the increased workload with no increase in staff hampers the ability to proactively protect Maine consumers and enforce the consumer protection laws of the state. If the additional position is not authorized, the Division may need to consider limiting the hours of the hotline, hampering timely responses to citizens and creating increased consumer frustration with the inability to bring more enforcement actions. Failure to fund this position will put at risk the Division's ability to respond, communicate, and serve thousands of consumers.

Justification:

Consumer contacts to the Consumer Protection Division have increased significantly over the years, from 6,874 in 2012 to more than 12,000 in 2015. As consumers become savvier about their rights and look to hold businesses accountable for the quality of the products they purchase, this Division will continue to receive an increasing number of complaints, which lead to investigations.

The Research Assistant Investigator position will find and interview witnesses, talk to consumers, locate assets, attend sales presentations, purchase products, subpoena phone records and examine computers - all as part of researching consumer complaints. Failure to create this position hinders the ability to investigate and prosecute businesses who are not following the law. As consumer awareness increases, people will look to this Division to protect them based on the law. The increased workload with no increase in staff hampers the ability to protect Maine consumers proactively and to enforce the consumer protection laws of the state. The Division will not be able to handle further increases in complaints and investigations to the Division without additional staff. If the additional position is not authorized, the Division may need to consider limiting the hours of the hotline, hampering timely responses to citizens.

The Chief Medical Examiner's office investigates all deaths due to other than natural disease or that cannot be certified by a private attending physician. The goal of the Office is to provide thorough investigations, to help solve crime and to support public health and public safety by providing accurate information about the cause of deaths in the state. The Office strives to provide timely reports to government agencies, families and other interested parties regarding the circumstantial and medical factors which cause death for the purposes of prosecution, departmental action, estate settlement, and statistical information for governmental recordkeeping and policy decisions.

This account is experiencing higher than anticipated revenues because the Chief Medical Examiner has processed more cremation certificates than originally projected. Funds in this account are used to support the operations of the Office, including a national accreditation effort.

Justification:

This initiative provides funding for contracted Forensic Pathologists to perform autopsies, complete associated reports, and other associated work. The additional contract pathologists are designed to distribute the case load, with the two full time pathologists, in a manner that will ensure efficient and timely completion of cases. Delays in processing of cases results in delays of closure for families and paperwork completion with insurance companies. The increase is three-fold: 1) A higher number of general autopsies and a surge in suspected and confirmed drug overdose cases. 2) Increasing the per autopsy fee from \$750 to \$1,000 per autopsy. The current fee has been in effect for more than six years; also it is approximately half the national average for the same services. 3) Paying this fee to Cary Medical Center that previously performed this service for free, but is unable to absorb the cost of doing so going forward.

Justification:

This initiative provides funding for annual costs related to national accreditation of the Maine Office of the Chief Medical Examiner (OCME). Accreditation is a necessary step for Maine's OCME as it has been established by the American Board of Pathology as a requirement for forensic pathologists to work in an accredited office in order to keep and renew their board certification. Board certification in forensic pathology is a statutory requirement in Maine to become the Chief or Deputy Chief Medical Examiner. Accreditation also shows that the Office has met the highest and best standards of practice. These funds will cover the accreditation inspection fee, annual calibration of scales, printing of annual reports, and purchasing annually updated field manuals. Failure to fund this request puts the Office at risk of not being able to recruit qualified personnel.

Chief Medical Examiner - Office of 0412 Initiative: Provides funding to increase the fee paid to non-salaried medical examiners and medicolegal death investigators. The mission of the Civil Rights Team Project (CRTP) is to increase the safety of elementary, middle, and high school students by reducing bias-motivated behaviors and harassment in schools. There are Civil Rights Teams in nearly 160 Maine schools and training is provided to thousands of students and faculty.

The Civil Rights Team Project trains, encourages and empowers high school, middle school and elementary school students to be leaders within their school communities in confronting bias, prejudice and harassment. Faculty in-service trainings increase the responsiveness of faculty and administrators to bias, prejudice and harassment. The program works with local police and schools to foster collaboration in addressing incidents of bias and harassment and increase awareness of parents and community members. The goal of the program is to improve the school experience for members of targeted groups (racial, religious, national origin, sexual orientation, etc.)

Justification:

The Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Office of Information Technology entered into an Enterprise Agreement with Microsoft, the vendor for the State of Maine's licensing suite for desktop applications and operating system. This agreement no longer offers "A la Carte" choices that could be made by agencies. The agreement offers the Office 365 "all-inclusive" system whereby the most common communication and file management services must be included in annual licenses required for desktop equipment. In cases where agencies did not utilize each of the services, as is the case for the Office of the Attorney General, the increase is significant (approximately \$7 per user per month to \$43). Additionally, the network access rate is increasing from \$41 per user per month to \$54. The Office of Attorney General replaces computers on a five year cycle.

Justification:

Historically, the eight District Attorneys' offices handle approximately 90,000 criminal and juvenile cases per year, as well as thousands of traffic and civil violations. This caseload is carried statewide with a staff of 88 Assistant District Attorneys and 8 elected District Attorneys. When traffic infractions and civil violations are factored in, as well as probation revocations, appeals to the Law Court, and other cases, each Assistant District Attorney handles very high caseloads.

The eight District Attorney offices prosecute the majority of all criminal offenses occurring in their district, with the exception of murder, including thousands of traffic infractions and civil violations.

The District Attorneys draft warrants, review police reports, screen criminal cases, prepare criminal complaints, motions, memoranda of law, legal briefs and other pleadings. They present felony cases to grand juries, argue motions, meet with police officers, witnesses and victims and try cases in District and Superior Courts. The District Attorney Offices also provide training and continuing legal education to law enforcement agencies in their districts.

This initiative funds 4 Assistant District Attorney (ADA) positions. This is a continuation of a 2015 Maine Prosecutor's Association initiative for 22 new ADA positions included in the FY16/17 Governor's budget. 10 positions were approved in the final budget. The District Attorneys by consensus determined where the 10 positions would be allocated. Since then 3 full-time equivalent Impaired Driving Special Prosecutors have been obtained through federal funding by Financial Order 003959 F7 (one each for District II, III and V) and another 2 by Financial Order 004037 F7 (one each for District I and IV). The District Attorneys have collectively agreed that the most critical unmet need is as follows: 1. An additional ADA for District V - Penobscot and Piscataquis counties; 2. An additional ADA for District III - Androscoggin, Oxford and Franklin counties; 3. A Prosecutor Coordinator to assist in the statewide coordination of prosecutor resources including training, drafting model policies, etc. 4. An additional ADA for District VII - Hancock and Washington counties. The additional positions will enable the DAs Offices to maintain case screening practices and enhance the quality of trials and appellate work to the benefit of public safety. Without these additional positions, prosecution priorities and policies will have to be adjusted.

With an existing Assistant Attorney General (AAG) dedicated to welfare fraud, this new AAG position will also prosecute crimes investigated by the Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) Fraud Unit. The number of welfare fraud investigators at DHHS has increased, which has led to additional referrals and prosecutions. The current prosecutor travels to all courts throughout Maine; adding a prosecutor will allow for splitting the state-wide coverage between the two. Currently, this busy office has seven Child Protection AAGs; two Child Support AAGs; and one general HHS AAG. The AAGs depend heavily on clerical staff. Justification:

Since 1967, Pine Tree Legal Assistance has provided free individual legal services to low-income Maine residents with serious civil legal problems. It handles cases that are not eligible for court-appointed counsel through the Maine Indigent Legal Defense Commission. Legal help is provided through a network of local field offices (Portland, Lewiston, Augusta, Bangor, Machias and Presque Isle) and through several statewide projects (serving Native Americans, low-income children, low-wage workers and homeowners at risk of foreclosure).

Pine Tree currently projects \$6,088,446 in expenses in fiscal year of 2016. Several of Pine Tree's traditional funding sources have decreased in recent years, including the loss of \$100,000 per a year from the Department of Justice to serve victims of domestic violence and loss more than \$75,000 in IOLTA funds to support general legal services.

The proposed State appropriation of \$500,000 a year will stabilize our statewide delivery system, representing 15% of our general legal services funding for the year. State funding also helps match other federal and foundation grant that can expand services around the State.


