TESTIMONY OF Stephen Bromage, Executive Director Maine Historical Society February 23, 2021

Senator Breen, Representative Pierce, members of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs; **Senator Daughtry, Representative Brennan**, members of the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs, my name is Steve Bromage, Executive Director of the Maine Historical Society. I am speaking in support of the Historical Society's item in the Biennial Budget.

Mission and programs

By way of background, Maine Historical Society (MHS) was founded in 1822—two years after Maine became a state— and has been collecting, preserving, and promoting research, scholarship, and engagement with Maine history ever since.

MHS is a private 501(c)3 non-profit whose mission is to preserve and share Maine's story.

With headquarters in Portland, MHS includes the **Brown Research Library**, **MHS Museum**, and **Maine Memory Network**.

(1) The **Brown Research Library** includes the most comprehensive collection of archival material related to Maine history in the state and serves researchers, scholars, educators, students, genealogists, the general public, and professionals from across many fields.

Through our research library, MHS supports extensive scholarly and collections activities—the foundation for meaningful civic dialog. MHS publishes the scholarly journal *Maine History* in partnership with the History Department at the University of Maine. We also host fellowships and scholarly forums, and have recently completed major collections care and access initiatives related to our photographic and clothing collections.

With funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities, we have just embarked on a major initiative to digitize our Proprietors and Northeast Boundary collections which document the settlement and distribution of land in Maine from the 17th through 19th centuries.

(2) The **MHS Museum** offers changing exhibitions and public programs that use Maine history to provide context for issues of contemporary interest and concern. Recent major initiatives explored immigration, veterans' issues, Maine's food heritage and economy, and Maine's evolving paper industry.

The first of our two major Bicentennial exhibitions, *Holding Up the Sky: Wabanaki People, Culture, History* & *Art*, which was open throughout 2019, explored 13,000 years of Wabanaki presence and stewardship of

Maine. It provided context for the Bicentennial by acknowledging that 200 years of Statehood is just one part of Maine's history.

This year's exhibition iniative—*Begin Again: Reckoing with Intolerance in Maine*—will explore how Maine fits into the national dialog on race and equity. Opening in May, it will include an exhibition, digital resources, extensive public programs delivered via Zoom, and educational resources that support remote learning.

Our Museum also includes the Wadsworth-Longfellow House (1785-86), a National Historic Landmark.

These resources are complemented by **public and educational programs** that provide educators, students, and the public with programs and resources designed to increase knowledge of Maine history, connect students to their communities, and build a variety of skills.

(4) Finally, the **Maine Memory Network** (<u>www.mainememory.net</u>), our nationally-recognized digital platform, empowers Maine communities to share their collections, stories, and perspectives. Maine Memory has evolved constantly since its launch in 2001 and become a robust platform for a wide range of historical interests and activity. It includes historical items contributed by 270 partners across Maine, hundreds of digital exhibits, educational resources, <u>My Maine Stories</u>—a portal that enables individuals to share their stories, and <u>Maine History Online</u>, a sprawling introduction to Maine. The model gives status to local knowledge and expertise, and radically expands the perspectives that are included in Maine history.

Public Service

Through these activities, MHS serves approximately 500,000 people each year on our campus; through outreach programs; and online.

Employees, Total Budget, and the General Fund

MHS is supported by 15 full-time and 16 part-time staff and a current operating budget of approximately \$1.6 million. Our budget is funded by membership, annual fund, earned income, endowment, and foundation and government grants. In the proposed Biennial Budget for 2022-2023, MHS would receive \$44,864 annually from the State of Maine General fund, or approximately 2.8% of our operating budget.

Funding Initiative

State funds received by Maine Historical Society support the development, maintenance, and outreach services provided through the Maine Memory Network. Annual operating costs for Maine Memory are approximately \$250,000 per year. In the current year, state funding accounts for 18% of its operations. Sustaining Maine Memory as a free and vital public resource is one of MHS's foremost strategic priorities. The state's general fund allocation remains essential to its sustainability.

Maine's Bicentennial

While the pandemic fundamentally affected the scale and spirit of Maine's Bicentennial commemoration, MHS was nonetheless able to adapt, provide programming, and create resources related to the Bicentennial that will be permanently accessible.

These include a **new Bicentennial section of Maine Memory** with extensive information about the Statehood process, and **new curricular resources** that MHS created in partnership with teachers around Maine and the Bicentennial Commission. Our second Bicentennial exhibit, *State of Mind: Becoming Maine*, which just closed, considered how multiple communities perceived and experienced Statehood, including the Wabanaki, African-Americans, English-speaking, and the Acadien French.

MHS also published a Bicentennial edition of Ronald Banks' classic book *Maine Becomes a State*, which provides a play-by-play of the statehood process, in partnership with the **Maine Cultural Affairs Commission** and support from the Bicentennial License Plate Fund. You should have each received a copy.

And, finally, we were able to pivot our **Bicentennial public programs online**. Our **Maine at 200** series began in September and will continue through March—each of the programs in the series is available online. In the next few weeks, Earle Shettleworth, Jr. and Colin Woodard will deliver the series' final programs.

Impact of Pandemic

The pandemic has brought both challenges and opportunities.

We estimate that MHS will lose approximately \$300k this year in revenue from admissions, fundraising events, and other sources impacted by the pandemic. We are working hard to replace that revenue and making progress. Maine Cares funding enabled MHS to avoid laying staff off.

Along with challenges, the pandemic has created opportunities for MHS. When it became clear that in-person activities were going to be extremely limited for the foreseeable future, we saw that MHS was well-positioned to adapt and shift our focus to the digital realm where we have developed significant resources and expertise.

With people homebound, socially-isolated, and desperate for connection, information, and entertainment, MHS staff focused on responding to those needs virtually.

Maine Memory Network provided a powerful starting place—giving us a digital platform to share Maine content, including historical context for the pandemic and social equity issues. MHS recorded 1.9 million page views from 500,000 users in 2020, a 47% increase over 2019.

Zoom has provided a new and powerful tool that is now enabling MHS to reach and serve people who care about Maine across the state and country. We have produced Zoom programming on topics ranging from the Bicentennial, to suffrage, to social justice issues, to a wide range of general Maine history topics. This enabled us to triple participation in our public programs in 2020—from approximately 1,000 people in person in 2019 to more than 3,000 via Zoom in 2020. Again, you can view each of those programs online.

Conclusion: Looking Forward

As we enter 2021, MHS is focused on what comes next: the opportunity and need to prepare Maine to thrive in its *next* century.

What are our dreams for Maine? What assets and opportunities will drive a strong economy and create prosperity for people and communities throughout the state? How will we address challenges like climate change and social, economic, and geographic inequity? How will we preserve and strengthen Maine's incredible sense of place?

History is essential to this process. Every aspect of Maine today is fundamentally shaped by history. The stories that MHS preserves and shares—the stories of *your* families and communities—provide a road map of how we got here, and of what makes Maine "Maine." They provide the context and information needed to unpack challenging legacies, and keys that can help us build a vibrant, forward-looking Maine.

State of Mind: Becoming Maine

March 13, 2020 to January 30, 2021



Description

State of Mind: Becoming Maine explored Maine as the homeland of the Wabanaki people, as a European province, as part of the District of Massachusetts, and the State of Maine. It considered Maine's Bicentennial milestone in relation to Maine's formation as a state 200 years ago; the significance of the Missouri Compromise; how the idea of "Maine" is perceived by people today; and how the changing landscape could alter Maine's future. The exhibition featured manuscripts and items relating to statehood, historic maps, contemporary artwork, and opportunities to learn about the experiences of Wabanaki people alongside the early settlers, including: European American, African American, and Acadian communities.

Holding Up the Sky: Wabanaki People, Culture, History & Art

April 12, 2019 - February 1, 2020



Description

Holding up the Sky explored Wabanaki philosophies of leadership and obligation relating to humans and non-humans by highlighting 13,000 years of Wabanaki residence in what is now known as Maine. Wabanaki co-curators guided the exhibition, interpreting 17th century colonial treaties, photographs, heritage items, and contemporary artworks everything from ash baskets to haute couture fashion. Wabanaki voices provide context for the present-day relevance and repercussions of 400 years of shared histories between

Wabanaki people and immigrants to their region. The exhibit featured 60 artists, 42 of them living.

Making Paper, Making Maine

June 2 through October 22, 2017



Description

Paper has shaped Maine's economy, molded individual and community identities, and impacted the environment throughout Maine. When Hugh Chisholm opened the Otis Falls Pulp Company in Jay in 1888, the mill was one of the most modern paper-making facilities in the country, and was connected to national and global markets. For the next century, Maine was an international leader in the manufacture of pulp and paper. *Making Paper, Making Maine* recognized the historic transition taking place in Maine's paper industry, and asked, what's next for Maine's economy? *This exhibition was generously supported by The Elsie A. Description

Co-curated by Tilly Laskey and Reza Jalali, a Kurd from Iran, educator, writer, scholar, human rights and refugee activist who has lived in Maine since 1985 and currently works for the University of Southern Maine. The exhibition was based upon black and white photos taken by Jan Pieter Van Voorst Van Beest, an immigrant from the Netherlands who has lived in Maine since 1970. The exhibition was augmented with items from MHS's permanent collections and loans from the community. Artist Natasha Mayers worked with international students from Portland Public Schools to paint lobster buoys with the flags of their home countries. The Buoys were installed on the historic iron gate of MHS's Wadsworth Longfellow House.

A Convenient Soldier: the Black Guards of Maine Fall 2020



Description

The Black Guards were African American army soldiers sent to guard the railways of Maine during WWII, from 1941-1945. The purpose of their deployment was to prevent terrorist attacks along the railways to keep Maine citizens safe during the war. This installation looks at the day-to-day lives of these loyal citizen-soldiers who stood watch during a time of

a racially segregated country and military. Their watch embodied the incongruity they faced straddling a complex state of racism, and a citizenship that was exercised as a matter of convenience during war-time.
