CALL TO ORDER

Speaker Fecteau called the January 27, 2022 meeting of the 130th Legislative Council to order at 1:40 p.m.

Speaker Fecteau convened the meeting at 1:40 p.m. with a quorum of members present.

SUMMARY OF NOVEMBER 18, 2021 MEETING OF LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Motion: That the Meeting Summary for November 18, 2021 be accepted and placed on file. Motion by President Jackson. Second by Senator Timberlake. **Motion passed unanimously (10-0-0-0).**

Speaker Fecteau expressed his intention to take items on the agenda out of order, without objection. The Speaker then moved to New Business, Item #1.

NEW BUSINESS

Item #1: Consideration of After-Deadline Bill Requests and Joint Resolutions

The Legislative Council proceeded to consider and vote on twenty-nine (29) after-deadline bill requests and one Joint Resolution. With respect to the after-deadline bill requests, the Legislative Council approved twelve (12) requests, rejected nine (9) requests, and tabled eight (8) requests. The Legislative Council rejected one Joint Resolution. The Legislative Council's action on the requests is attached.

Upon conclusion of New Business Item #1, Speaker Fecteau returned to the agenda.

REPORTS FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND COUNCIL OFFICES

Fiscal Report

Chris Nolan, Director of the Office of Fiscal and Program Review, presented the following report.

1. General Fund Revenue Update

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$84.6 million for the month of December and over budget by \$90.4 million (3.8%) for the fiscal year to date. **These positive variances now reflect the December 2021 revenue forecast, which increased budgeted General Fund revenue by \$443.2 million for FY 2022.**

Individual income tax revenue was over budget by \$38.3 million for the month and by \$38.3 million (3.7%) for the fiscal year to date. This positive variance for the month was largely the result of a positive variance in individual income tax withholding. Corporate income tax revenue was over budget by \$36.2 million for the month and by \$36.2 million (23.2%) for the fiscal year to date. Sales and use tax revenue for December (November sales) was over budget by \$7.3 million for the month and by \$7.3 million (0.7%) for the fiscal year to date.

2. Highway Fund Revenue Update

Highway Fund revenue was over budget by \$1.0 million for the month of December and by \$2.3 million (1.3%) for the fiscal year to date. **These positive variances now reflect the December 2021 revenue forecast, which increased budgeted Highway Fund revenue by \$4.0 million for FY 2022.**

Fuel taxes were over budget by \$0.8 million for the month and over budget by \$0.8 million (0.7%) for the fiscal year to date. Motor vehicle registrations and fees were above budget by \$0.1 million for the month and over budget by \$0.5 million (1.1%) for the fiscal year to date.

3. Cash Balances Update

The average balance in the cash pool for December was 3,642.2 million, a decrease from November's average of \$3,832.3 million. The net decrease was largely the result of decreases in Other Special Revenue Funds balances partially offset by increases in General Fund balances. The average Highway Fund balance in December was \$20.8 million, a decrease from November's average of \$45.1 million, the result of the annual payment to the Local Road Assistance program being made in December.

4. Economic and Revenue Forecast Meetings

The Consensus Economic Forecasting Commission (CEFC) is scheduled to meet on Friday, January 28th to review and update the economic forecast for its February 1st report. The Revenue Forecasting Committee (RFC) will then meet in late February to review and update the revenue forecast for its March 1st report.

Studies Report

Danielle Fox, Director, Office of Policy and Legal Analysis, presented the studies report included in the agenda packet.

Chief Clancy indicated that after completion of his assessment, he would share his observations with the Council, along with any recommendations regarding any proposed refinements or enhancements to the security of the campus.

General Fund revenue was over budget by \$43.0 million for the month of January and over budget by \$133.4 million (4.7%) for the fiscal year to date.

Individual income tax revenue was over budget by \$19.9 million for the month and by \$58.3 million (4.5%) for the fiscal year to date. This positive variance for the month was largely the result of a positive variance in individual income tax estimated payments and for the fiscal year to date, is a combination of positive variances in the individual income tax withholding and estimated payment lines. Corporate income tax revenue was over budget by \$11.5 million for the month and by \$47.6 million (29.7%) for the fiscal year to date. Sales and use tax revenue for January (December sales) was over budget by \$3.2 million for the month and by \$10.5 million (0.8%) for the fiscal year to date. Estate tax revenue was over budget by \$3.7 million for January and by \$6.3 million (26.1%) for the fiscal year to date.

ANNUAL REPORT October 1, 2020 – September 30, 2021

Introduction

Pursuant to the provisions of Title 5 of Maine Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 383, Subchapter 3, Article 2-A, the Washington County Development Authority is required to submit an annual report to the Governor, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over business and economic development matters. The report must be submitted no later than 120 days after the close of the authority's fiscal year. The Authority's fiscal year ended on September 30, 2021.

Section 13083-F of 5 MRSA requires that the annual report of the Authority include:

- A. A description of the authority's operations and activities;
- B. An accounting of the authority's receipts and expenditures and assets and liabilities at the end of its fiscal year;
- C. A listing of all property transactions pursuant to section 13083-D;
- D. A statement of the authority's proposed and projected activities for the ensuing year; and
- E. Recommendations regarding further actions that may be suitable for achieving the purposes of this article.

History of the Authority

The Washington County Development Authority was established by the Second Regular Session of the 120th Maine Legislature as Chapter 568 of the Laws of Maine 2001. The Authority was established in response to the need to create a state entity that could take title to the former Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station in Cutler, Maine from the United States Navy. Since that time, the legislation was amended to broaden the scope of the authority's mission to allow the authority to provide financial and technical assistance to any governmental entity and nonprofit located within Washington County in support of community and economic development projects. Representation was expanded to include all municipalities in Washington County, including the unorganized territories.

For the reporting period, the Authority was comprised of the following members: Elizabeth "Betsy" Fitzgerald (Machiasport), Renee Gray (Addison), Julie Jordan (Jonesport), Ron McAlpine (Crawford), Lewis Pinkham (Milbridge), and Lani Reynolds (Northfield). The DECD Appointee seat is currently vacant.

For this time period, the following officers were elected: Betsy Fitzgerald (Chair), Lewis Pinkham (Vice Chair), and Lani Reynolds (Treasurer). For the reporting period Heron Weston has not participated in the Authority, nor has he given a resignation. For this reporting period, the WCDA set monthly meetings on the third Monday of every month at 1:00 pm at Sunrise County Economic Council and now holds its meetings virtually hosted by SCEC.

The Authority can have up to 13 voting members. At this point, there are seven Trustees.

Operations and Activities

The WCDA Trustees scheduled 11 regular meetings from October 2020 to September 2021. Major items of discussion during the course of the report period included the following subjects:

The Washington County Development Authority continues to contract with Sunrise County Economic Council to provide administrative services.

The Authority continues to use support from the Washington County Council of Governments Brownfields Program to evaluate the structures hazardous materials and degradation to the buildings under previous ownership. The Authority has been contacted by several individuals/entities interested in utilizing the Recreation Building for various purposes. An environmental engineer's report has identified lead paint and some PCBs in the building. An EPA Clean Up Grant in the amount of \$500,000 has been awarded to the authority and work will start on the Recreation Building in 2022. The Authority is now waiting to hear whether an additional EPA grant for cleanup of the Administration Building will be awarded. The building has been secured until repairs can be made. In addition, the Authority is still awaiting work from the U.S. Navy regarding cleanup of hazardous materials at the Rec Building.

During the year, the Authority had continued to manage the commercial buildings at the de-commissioned Cutler Base. The WCDA continues to lease space to Look's Gourmet Food Company, Inc and Crafted Downeast, LLC. The Authority contracted by competitive bid with Roof Systems of Maine and to repair the Warehouse roof and improve the drainage at the Warehouse. The work was completed in October 2021 at a total cost of \$23,065.50.

Property Transactions:

The WCDA obtained no new property this year.

Proposed and Projected Activities

The Authority intends to continue its work to redevelop the former Cutler Navy Base as resources are slowly becoming available for certain areas of the base, however, there continues to be a lack of resources for the base as a whole. The Authority received an EPA Grant of \$500,000 for the clean-up of hazardous materials and degradation of the Recreation Building. Work on the Recreational Building will commence in 2022. Also, the Authority anticipates a retrofit of the abutting building to the Warehouse into large freezers for a Warehouse tenant. Sunrise County Economic Council and Washington County Government have provided what staff support they can, but the Authority's Trustees are handling much of the day-to-day management of the property as volunteers. The Authority's sole source of income is rent, which has been entirely used for the maintenance and repair of the property. In short, the redevelopment effort is hobbled by the lack of resources.

With continued support from the Washington County Council of Governments' Brownfield Program, the Authority plans to attempt to raise funds to pay for needed clean up and renovation to some of its property.

The Authority is seeking new tenants to fill vacant commercial space in the base and continues to look for funding to repair former structures.

Recommendations
