I also want to point out although we all know every team member contributes to success, Raegan Cowan has been named Player of the Year for Eight-Person South by the Maine Principal Association as a junior, and Coach Carrier was named Coach of the Year for Eight-Person South Region by the Maine Principal's Association. So, I want to extend a hearty congratulations, welcome to the State House, enjoy the day today, and we'll see you again next year. Thank you, Mr. President.

WHEREAS, according to research, firefighters have a 9% greater chance of being diagnosed with cancer and a 14% greater chance of dying from cancer than the general population; and

WHEREAS, occupational cancer is a leading cause of lineof-duty deaths in firefighters and has reached epidemic levels; and

WHEREAS, studies have found a direct correlation between the chemical exposures firefighters experience on the job and an increased risk of cancer for those firefighters; and

WHEREAS, all 50 states recognize cancer as a presumptive workers' compensation claim for firefighters; and

WHEREAS, early detection of cancer through routine screening leads to earlier treatment and better disease outcomes, including improved survival and reduced morbidity; and

WHEREAS, the International Association of Fire Fighters and the Firefighter Cancer Support Network have declared January as Fire Fighter Cancer Awareness Month; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize January 2024 as Firefighter Cancer Awareness Month, and we encourage fire departments across the State to participate in the activities of the International Association of Fire Fighters and the Firefighter Cancer Support Network.

Dear Senate President Jackson,

Enclosed are the reports required under 5 M.R.S.A. §12023, due February 1, 2024. The reports include: a list of all procurements in 2023 exceeding \$10,000 for which competitive procurement was waived; a list of contributions made in 2023 that exceed \$1,000. Section 12023(2c) requires a description of changes to the written policies and procedures required by Section 12022. There were no changes to the policies and procedures required by this section in 2022, therefore, there is nothing to report.

In 2023, the Maine Turnpike Authority made over \$120 million in payments to approximately 700 vendors. The vast majority of these payments, approximately \$101 million, were for competitively bid products or services or were legally or legislatively required. The Authority sole-sourced approximately \$18.7 million in 2023. Most of these products or services were either proprietary in nature or were procured under long-term contracts. As these long-term contracts expire, the Authority will seek competitive bids.

JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY 2024 AS 211 MAINE MONTH

WHEREAS, 211 Maine is a Maine-based health and human services and emergency preparedness and response helpline that provides Maine people free and confidential referrals to needed resources; and

WHEREAS, 211 Maine provides around-the-clock service statewide, offering efficient and effective responses to questions arising from the growing complexities in health, financial and human services and the needs of Maine people from people

employed in Maine, including interpreters for multilanguage users; and

WHEREAS, since 2006, 211 Maine call specialists have assisted with requests for information regarding topics ranging from substance use and recovery services to housing support and food resources, and in 2023 fielded over 77,000 calls, text messages and e-mails from people looking for help for themselves or someone they know; and

WHEREAS, 211 Maine provides emergency operations support during times of natural and other disasters, including assisting the Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency Management, Maine Emergency Management Agency by fielding calls from those affected by windstorms and floods, collecting data regarding incidence severity and locations of need and directing people to local warming shelters and cooling centers; and

WHEREAS, during this past year, 211 Maine provided over 11,000 referrals for heating and utility assistance services, helping individuals find appropriate assistance programs, which may have prevented their contacting the wrong agency for heating assistance, prevented utility shut-offs and saved people from spending winter nights without fuel; and

WHEREAS, 211 Maine handles a number of specialized services and partnerships, including serving as the centralized access point for the Help Me Grow Maine program, which helps families with children from birth to 8 years of age to access needed services, providing the opiate helpline and the gambling helpline and serving as a resource for finding information about needs such as tax preparation, mental health services and browntail moth caterpillar prevention, mitigation and treatment; and

WHEREAS, 211 Maine provides a powerful example of how the government and nonprofit and private sectors can work together to improve the quality of life of the people of Maine; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the Second Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize February 2024 as 211 Maine Month.

And thank you very much, Mr. President, for the opportunity, and thanks again to the folks at 211 and the United Way for all the good work they're doing.

The **PRESIDENT**: The Chair recognizes the Senator from Cumberland. Senator Duson.

Senator DUSON: Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Maine Senate. I rise today to offer comments in acknowledgment of the first day of Black History Month. Let's begin with a spotlight on the history of the celebration itself. The story of Black History Month begins in Chicago during the summer of 1915. Dr. Carter G. Woodson traveled from Washington DC to Chicago to participate in a national celebration of the 50th anniversary of emancipation sponsored by the State of Illinois. Later that year, Woodson helped co-found the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. In 1920, Dr. Woodson urged black civic organizations to promote the research being uncovered by black scholars in the Journal of Negro History, and in 1924, they responded with the creation of Negro History and Literature Week. Negro History Week was celebrated in the second week of February because it involved -- it includes the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln. Dr. Woodson and fellow historians believed that the celebration of black history should expand beyond these two men and focus on the countless black men and women who contributed to the advance of human civilization. He commented that Lincoln alone did not free the slaves, that was the work of the Union Army, including hundreds of thousands of black soldiers and sailors. Those soldiers included David Luth, who served in Company D of the 24th Regiment of the United Stated Colored Troops, my fourth greatgrandfather, and William Albert Burton, Sr., who served in the 26th regiment of the United States Colored Troops. William Burton was my third great-grandfather. In 1975, President Ford was the first president to issue a message urging Americans to
